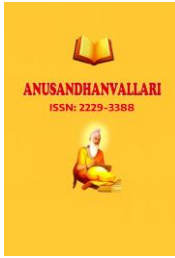
### 1. Introduction

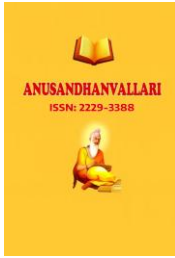
##### 3.4 Secondary Data Collection

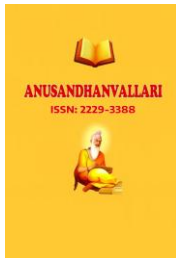
#### Interpretation:

**4.4 Role in Family Decision-Making**

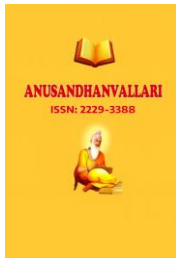
