

Revival of Metaphysical Thought in GenZ: A Study of E- Content

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Abstract

This research paper aims to examine how metaphysical poetry has revived and evolved through the digital poetic expressions of Generation Z by analyzing essential features of metaphor, paradox and unified sensibility found in their social media poetry compositions, focused mainly on Instagram & Tiktok posts as a way for these young authors about identity, morality, love and spirituality expressed through close textual analysis. As shown in this paper, poetry of Generation Z is a new metaphysical tradition combining wit and sentiment paired with the real-life struggles and cultures that arise from coming-of-age during an era defined by technology. Introduction:

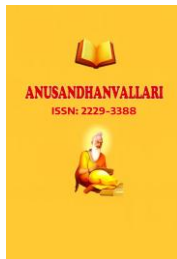
Neo Metaphysics in the Hashtag Era

. The fear of loss, questions of identity and the search for meaning in an increasingly chaotic world are the mess that move across centuries linking Donne's religious, uncertainty with a Generation Z poet's existential thoughts or ideas posted at midnight.

Form and Format are the other important outlook in this research. Metaphysical poets who were known for bending poetic convention- shifting meter, breaking rhyme schemes, using colloquial speech. Generation Z replicate this subversion. Their poetic form are adaptive shaped by hashtags, visual representation, voice over narrative and audience interaction. 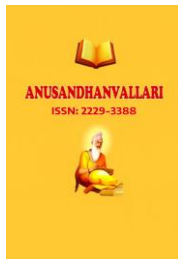

Literature Review:

Miller argues that the confessional nature of generation Z poetry mirrors, the spiritual confessions of metaphysical verse, albeit in secular, individualised terms.



poetic impulse in the digital age. Gardener's work provides a strong foundation for comparative analysis, as many of the metaphysical traits — she identifies— paradox, conceit, introspective depth— are evident in contemporary digital poetry.

Research Methodology

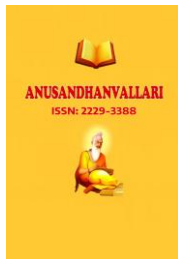
While previous generations wrote poems in solitude in hopes of getting published in literary magazines, Gen Z poets share their words unfiltered, incomplete, and raw in an instant.

Themes that resonate: Morality, Love, Identity and Time

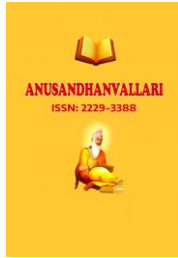
The themes which are most commonly explored by Generation Z are surprisingly constant with metaphysical preoccupations. Though the language and context have changed but the core anxieties remain:

A Generation of Thinkers in Feelers' Clothing

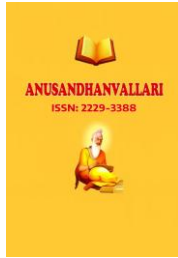

GenZ's use of paradox signals their understanding that emotional truth is rarely simple. Life, like poetry, must accommodate contradiction.

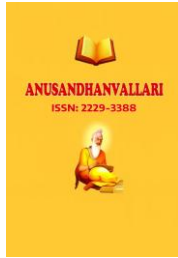
3. Unified Sensibility: Feeling as Thinking.

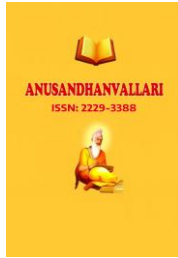
GenZ also engages in this rhetorical structure. Consider this excerpt:

My Spotify playlist says otherwise

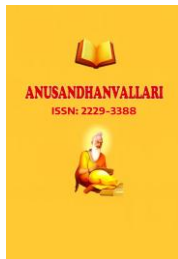

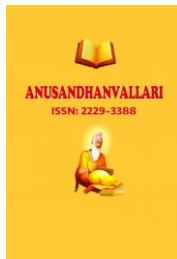
Consider this poem from a non-binary GenZ poet:

CONCLUSION and Findings

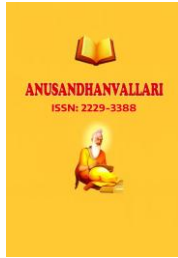
Metaphysical spirit, Digital Voice: A Poetic Sequence

Metaphysical poets like John Donne and George Herbert gave voice to the complex inner lives of lives of their age: Exploring love, morality, spirituality and identity with paradox, wit and philosophical intensity. Their legacy is not simply in language, but in intention— to write poetry that things, feels and argues and questions. Generation Z facing of fragmented, hyperconnected world now takes up that mantle— expressing their own crisis, desires and insights through poetic forms, shaved by social media, algorithm and emotional candor.

This study has demonstrated that the stylist stick features of metaphysical poetry – conceited, paradox, unified sensibilities, rhetorical arguments and spiritual searching – continue to resonate in generation Z's work. Their poems may be posted in Instagram captions or whispered into TikTok reels, but their concerns are as ancient as Donne's own: What is the nature of love? How do we face death? Who am I when the world is silent?

My Generation Z digital poetry, far from being simple is where complexity gets distilled, a place of raw feeling juxtaposed to reflective depths. It is the translation of confession into communion, metaphor to memory and identity written word by word.



A Road Ahead: Digital Humanism and Poetic Futures

With our tangible reality becoming more intertwined with the digital sphere, GenZ's poetic evolution is a blueprint for how art can not only survive in virtual worlds but thrive. These recent explorations open exciting avenues for: digital humanities research that offers gradients of how classical forms endure in digital native genres; mental health and therapeutic practice through poetic writing as a collaborative method to engage healing and identity work; educational reform, weaving together social media poetry into literary studies connecting one line Donne with the global transmission of his ideas across cultures today (i.e. Cross culture studies on select themes from this anthology revealing globalization presence within generation Z poets cutting across linguistic and cultural traditions)

The study of new metaphysical poetry in generation Z is not just literally analysis. It is a cultural archaeology of feeling a way of understanding how one generation deals with the timeless tensions of being alive.

Final Thought

If metaphysical poetry was once the language of the soul trying to understand its place in the cosmos, then Generation Z's poetry is the soul which is trying to locate itself in the cloud. In both forms, poetry remains a compass not always pointing north but always pointing inward.

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
