

The Enduring Appeal of Enid Blyton's *The Famous Five*: A Study in Development and Adaptation

Abstract

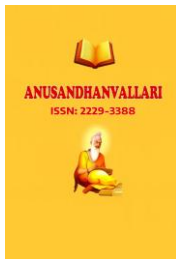
Adventure, mystery and friendship are some of the well loved themes in children's literature. Enid Blyton in her popular series, *The Famous Five* blends these themes with exciting plots and engaging storytelling which has captivated the interest of the readers, leading to its enduring appeal over the years. This paper aims to explore the development of the series into various adaptations keeping in view the factors that have contributed to its continued legacy and attempts to surmise the vast account of The Famous Five series in its developments and adaptations through observation and historical analysis. Adaptations of the series into media platforms such as Television, DVDs, web series, comics, audiobooks, gamebooks and puzzles as well as development of the series into continuation books and illustrated books have been outlined in this paper, adding to the understanding that the need to cater to the contemporary sensibilities has played a major role in the modification of the series, thus enabling the series to continue its lasting appeal. These developments stand as a testament of the extensive scope that this series has expanded into, over time.

Research Paper

The Famous Five series written by the British writer Enid Blyton has amassed a worldwide popularity due to its stories of adventure, friendship and mystery. With its compelling storytelling, the series has served the readers with a sense of excitement and a promise of what could be. The 'Five' comprising the characters Julian, Dick, Anne, George and Timmy journey through the series collectively searching for hidden treasures, outwitting villains and solving mysteries during their school holidays. Published first in 1942, the series had an impressive run of twenty-one full length novels over its consecutive years, garnering a global readership spanning generations till date. More than a hundred million copies of the series have been sold all over the world, owing its enduring appeal to the fame the series had garnered. The Famous Five has been adapted into television series, films, animated cartoons and stage plays, etching its place in popular culture.

The objective of this paper is to delve into the various factors behind the enduring appeal of the Famous Five series. From the inception of the series, its gradual development over the years, factors contributing to its lasting appeal, its adaptations across various forms of media, to its capacity to adapt to modern sensibilities while retaining its main essence, the paper will explore and examine the evolution of the Famous Five series which has marked its place in the legacy of children's literature.

The Famous Five series began with the publication of the first book *Five on a Treasure Island* in 1942. This book introduced the core elements that would define the rest of the series: a group of intelligent and resourceful children, a loyal and protective dog, exciting adventures and thrilling mysteries in addition to the settings of aesthetically pleasing rural Britain. Blyton had shaped the five main characters Julian, Dick, Anne, George and Timmy in such a way that each character contributes unique skills and perspectives to the group. They embody the spirit of



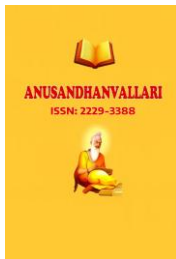
adventure and self-reliance throughout the series making them much beloved to the readers. Blyton's style of writing is noted for its simplicity, interesting plots and relatable characters, evoking within the reader a sense of unrealized dream and the desire to be associated with the adventurous group, contributing to the lasting appeal of the series.

Enid Blyton had initially planned to write a series of six books but with the soaring commercial success of The Famous Five, she had written twenty-one full length books¹ for over two decades, making it her longest running series (Rudd, 166). The series had gained massive popularity so much so that by the end of 1953, more than six million copies had been sold. Currently more than two million copies of the books are sold each year, with sales totalling over a hundred million copies worldwide, making The Famous Five one of the best selling series written for children (Fullerton). Following its popularity Blyton had also written eight short stories² based on the five main characters of the series viz., Julian, Dick, Anne, George and Timmy ("The Famous Five – Enid Blyton").

Initially when Blyton began to publish, the series was referred to as 'The Fives' books. Later, after about nine books had been published, Hodder & Stoughton, Blyton's publisher in 1951 had termed the series 'The Famous Five' based on the popularity the series had gained (Lupson). This title helped establish the identity of the series and has kept it popular ever since. As a result of the series' popularity, many adaptations across media have taken place, each with its own interpretation of the original stories with an aim of introducing the series to the new audiences by keeping it relevant in a constantly changing world.

While the publishing timeline of the Famous Five book series is placed between the years 1942-1962, two black and white films based on the books *Five on a Treasure Island* in 1957 and *Five Have a Mystery to Solve* in 1964 have been made by The Children's Film Foundation retaining the same titles of the books for the films. The 1957 film *Five on a Treasure Island* directed by Gerald Landau, is featured as an eight part film serial, each with a length of 15 minutes totalling a runtime of two hours and it follows the story of four friends and their dog on the hunt for a shipwrecked treasure (ReelStreets). As Montgomery puts it, the film is claimed to be "really just about perfect for younger adventure lovers...who haven't lost the itch for a good thrill with age" (DVD Beaver). Directed by Ernest Morris, the 1964 film *Five Have a Mystery to Solve* is an adventure where the Famous Five along with Wilfrid uncover a secret at whispering island, solving a mystery involving a hidden treasure and suspicious strangers. It is segmented into 6 parts of 15 minutes each making it a 90 minute film serial. The location of both the films is set in the South East and South West regions of Britain creating a sense of national connection for the viewers and drawing them closer to the world of the book series. DVD Beaver claims that both the films were "tremendously entertaining" as they were "never shown on television, or previously released on video or DVD, this is essential for Blyton aficionados" thereby asserting a special appeal for Blyton's fans (DVD Beaver).

The burgeoning fame of The Famous Five series had led to films being produced in Denmark and Germany. Katrine Hedman, a Danish director, had adapted two of The Famous Five stories into films with an all Danish cast. The first film titled *De fem og spionerne* (translated into English as Five and the Spies) in 1969 and the second film *De 5 i fedtefadet* (translated into English as Famous Five Get in Trouble) in 1970 were originally released in Danish (Danskefilm.dk). Initially the exposure of these Danish films was limited to Denmark making them exclusive to collectors and fans. Later with the release of the DVD versions of the films, accessibility has been made possible. In Germany the *Funf Freunde* film series had been released in five parts namely *Funf Freunde* in 2012, *Funf Freunde 2* in 2013, *Funf Freunde 3* in 2014, *Funf Freunde 4* in 2015 and *Funf Freunde und das Tal der Dinosaurier* in 2018 (Famous Five Wiki). The series had become widely popular in the German speaking countries. The German title *Funf Freunde* translates as Five Friends in English and as the title suggests, the film series is loosely based on Blyton's Famous Five series. However what sets it apart from the original series is its modern setting which gives the adaptations a contemporary touch while maintaining the core essence of the characters and adventures. With the release of DVD versions, the Danish and German films became widely accessible despite their initially limited exposure. This delayed availability affirms the longstanding charm of



Blyton's adventure stories, highlighting their ability to resonate with the audiences even in culturally and linguistically adapted versions.

Besides film adaptations, the Famous Five series was also adapted into television series bringing it closer to the home audiences and expanding its reach. The first version of *The Famous Five* television series was aired from 1978 to 1979 with the same name as the book series and was produced by Southern Television for ITV, a UK wide public television network channel. This version aimed for a faithful adaptation of the book series which was released on a weekly basis with a total of twenty six episodes³, each with an airtime of half an hour (IMDb, *The Famous Five* 1978). The entire series had been released on DVD in the UK in 2012 and also made available on ITVS, an online streaming platform, expanding its coverage to a larger viewership. Another *Famous Five* TV series was co-produced by Tyne Tees and HTV in 1995 and aired till 1997 as two seasons consisting of twenty six episodes⁴ in total each with a runtime of 25 minutes (IMDb, *The Famous Five* 1995). Set in the 1950s the series remained true to the original stories while updating certain elements to make it relatable to contemporary audiences. *Famous Five: On The Case* is a 2008 animated television series of twenty six episodes⁵, which is loosely based on the Famous Five novels (IMDb, *Famous 5: On the Case*). This series portrays a more inclusive cast, introducing new characters from diverse nationalities, cultures and backgrounds. Departing from the limitations of the original novels' time period, the series incorporated a modern twist by making use of new technology such as mobile phones and laptop computers making the animated version relatable as well as appealing to the younger audiences of the twenty first century. However, this modification seems far-fetched from the original stories making the adaptation feel significantly different from Blyton's classic portrayal. According to Rudd, *The Famous Five* is the most filmed series with its popularity endorsed by the children of the 90s (Rudd, 165). The 2023 BBC adaptation of *The Famous Five* series is a reimagined version of the original adventure stories. The first part of the series contains three episodes⁶, each with a length of 90 minutes followed by the second part released in 2024, with two episodes⁶ of the same time length (Matuku). Although the series faced criticism for deviating from Blyton's original vision, it was also well received for its modern adaptation of the classic stories. All these TV adaptations have updated their series to appeal to 'a progressive new audience.' This evolution is evident in the casting choices and adaptations that reflect modern values.

Many musical adaptations of *The Famous Five* had taken shape over the years, each bringing a unique take on Blyton's stories. In 1997, a musical titled *The Famous Five* was produced to commemorate the centenary birth anniversary of Enid Blyton. It was later released on DVD as *The Famous Five - Smuggler's Gold - The Musical* (World of Blyton). Another musical titled *Enid Blyton The Famous Five* began its premiere at the Tabard theatre from December 2009 and ran until January 2010 (UK Theatre Web). The production was met with praise, with the Chiswick Times stating "The first adjectives which came into my critical mind when the curtain fell on this musical version of the children's classic were brilliant and delightful. So I turned to my ten year old grandson, Jesse, for a more up-to-date appraisal and he came up with 'cool and energetic' which I think can be classed as the modern equivalent." After over a decade, *The Famous Five: A New Musical* premiered in 2022 at the Chichester festival theatre in the UK. Unlike the previous adaptation, this musical introduced an original storyline that showcased how the five characters first came together rather than adapting an existing book. The show featured engaging songs and dynamic performances by the actors who portrayed the characters of the Famous Five stories (Theatres South East). Critics appreciated the energetic performance of the musical, though some stated that it lacked compelling plotlines which is characteristic of Blyton's works. Despite certain drawbacks, the production was praised for its vibrant direction, lively performances and intricate lyrics, successfully introducing Blyton's beloved characters to a new generation.

Among the well known Famous Five spin off novels are the *Les Cinq* series written in French by Claude Voilier between 1971 and 1985 (Voilier, *Les Cinq sont les plus forts*). The twenty four books⁷ were initially published in a hardback and these books featured comic illustrations every second page making them the first of the comic

editions of The Famous Five series. These continuation novels attained fame partly due to their English translations by Anthea Bell between 1981 and 1987 as the Knight editions (Voilier, *The Famous Five and the Stately Homes Gang*). Voilier's books differed from Blyton's originals in style and content, they have a faster pace, omit detailed descriptions and take the characters on international adventures.

The German continuation novels consist of two separate series, one of which was written by Brigitte Blobel during 1977 and 1979 as two books⁸ which were later withdrawn due to copyright objections (Blobbel). The second series was written by Sarah Bosse between 2004 and 2012 as twenty five illustrated books⁹ portraying new mysteries and adventures, incorporating supernatural themes and global settings (Bosse). Despite their popularity in Germany these illustrated books remained untranslated into English.

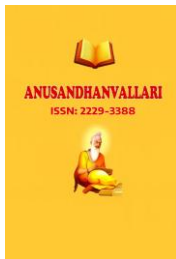
The *Just George* series by Sue Welford is a Famous Five prequel with its focus solely on the characters George and Timmy. The series explores their first interaction, early adventures and George's journey towards her rebellious identity. This six-book series¹⁰ was published in 2000 (Enid Blyton Society, *Just George*).

The book series *The Famous 5: On The Case* published by Hodder Children's Books during 2008 and 2009 is a spin off adaptation of the animated 26 episodic TV series with the same name which featured the children of the original characters of the Famous Five book series namely Jo, Max, Allie, Dylan and Timmy II. The series consists of 24 cases¹¹ presented in a 'flipper' format with two stories per volume (Famous 5: On the Case). Despite the series being credited to Enid Blyton, the author remains unknown. The stories humorously titled follow the new generation solving quirky and eccentric mysteries.

There are a few standalone Famous Five books outside the original book series. *The Famous Five Diary* by Mary Danby was published in 1988 by Knight Books. Another standalone titled *The Famous Five Adventure File* by an unknown author was released in 1998. In 2009, *Adventures with George and Timmy* was published by Hodder's Children's Books, compiling the first three original novels under different titles with added activity sections related to the stories in between. It includes adventure tips and tricks for young mystery solvers.

Adapted and illustrated by Natael and Beja, graphic novels were released in English, the first one titled *The Famous Five Graphic Novel: Five on a Treasure Island*, which is the same name as the first book in the original series. These graphic novels brought the classic adventures to life through their bright pictorial depictions, vivid illustrations and engaging storytelling (Natael and Beja). Following the aforementioned graphic novel, three more graphic novels¹² were released in a consequential order of the main book titles with a promise of more to come. Besides English, these adaptations have been translated into multiple languages such as French, German, Dutch, Portuguese and have gained widespread recognition and popularity especially among the young readers in these countries, which has added to their joy of reading and introduced them to the world of The Famous Five. The graphic novels have been praised for their ability to capture the excitement and charm of the original adventure stories, appealing to both long-time fans and new readers.

The Famous Five has also featured as comics, particularly in Britain, in the *Look-In* weekly anthology based on the 1978-1979 TV series. Illustrated mainly by Mike Noble, the comics aimed to deliver the essence of the adventures (Lambiek Comiopedia). In France, six comics with the title *Les Club des Cinq*¹³, were published between 1982 and 1986, with three comic books later released in English by Knight Books (Grand Comics Database). In 1985, Enid Blyton's Adventure magazine ran for seventeen issues (Downthetubes), each issue featuring a full length illustrative comic book story adapted from the famous five novels (Rudd, 166). The comic stories presented the group of five characters arriving at an idyllic location before diving into mystery and adventure. This charming artwork evoked a nostalgic feeling that stayed true to the timeless appeal of the British stories ("The Famous Five at 75"). Other adaptations included *The Famous Five* annuals released between 1978 and 1986 and the *Enid Blyton Mystery and Suspense* comic series released in 1997 which also featured *The Secret*



Seven (Enid Blyton Society). Hachette's group continues to publish new novels with modern covers to appeal to the new generation.

The Famous Five has been the subject of a number of parodies reflecting nostalgia and satire. With an exaggerated portrayal of the Five with outdated and controversial views, The Comic Strips produced *Five Go Mad in Dorset* in 1982 and *Five Go Mad on Mescaline* in 1983. The series was later revived in 2012 with *Five Go To Rehab* showing the characters struggling with middle age crisis (British Comedy Guide). Parodies began as early as 1964 with John Lennon's *The Famous Five Through Wootton Abbey* and continued with Viz magazine, the D-Generation's *The Famous Five Get Their Teeth Kicked In* and Jamie Rix's *The Chipper Chums Go Scrumping*. There are also other satirical takes including Bert Fegg's *Nasty Book for Boys and Girls*, John Finnemore's radio sketch and *The Guardian's* critique of the characters. In 2016 Bruno Vincent released a five book spoof series with titles like *Five Go Gluten Free* and *Five On Brexit Island*, later expanding with more installments¹⁴ (Waterstones). This humorous spoof series released as Blyton's 75th anniversary merchandise was written for the adult audience reinforcing the series' lasting cultural and generational impact.

The Famous Five series had also been made into audiobooks. Hodder Headline produced all the twenty one books into audio dramas available as cassettes and CDs in the late 1990s (Enid Blyton Society). In Germany, Funf Freunde audio dramas began in the 1970s featuring the German dubbing artists from the first Famous Five TV series. More than 110 radio plays have been released in Germany, expanding the Famous Five universe with new stories by various German writers. Newer versions of the famous five audiobooks in English were published by Hachette's Children's Group and Hodder's Children's Book for the audiobook streaming services Apple Books and Audible respectively ("Famous Five Audiobook Series"; "Famous Five Audiobooks | Audible.com").

Despite the popularity of the original Famous Five series, modern adaptations have sought to address criticisms and update the series for modern audiences to keep up with the ever changing scenario of the society. Alongside adaptations, the Famous Five series had also undergone editorial changes over the years aligning with the evolving socio-cultural norms. Some of the early changes had taken place towards the end of the 1960s where the word 'King' was replaced with 'Queen' in *Five On A Treasure Island*. According to the 2010 edition of the Hodder's Children's Books words such as 'fancy' was replaced with the word 'imagine', 'lamp' with the word 'torch', 'queer' with the words 'strange', 'odd' and 'funny', 'field-glasses with 'binoculars' to name a few of the many changes that were made to align with the contemporary society (Quinteiro, 16-18). There were also other minor modifications where the word jeans was swapped for skirt, scholarship reference for exam, modifying Anne's preference for dolls to teddies and the removal of the mention of steam trains. In the 2010 edition of *Five Go Off In a Caravan*, the character Nobby was renamed as Ned (Flood). These changes reflect the publishers' efforts to maintain the appeal of The Famous Five series for contemporary readers. Hodder & Stoughton, for example, completely revised the twenty one Famous Five books by removing offensive or outdated language to align with modern sensibilities (Chung). While these changes sought to make the books more accessible and relatable to the contemporary audiences, they also raised concerns about the preservation of the authenticity of the original books, striking a debate about the balance between modernization and preserving historical integrity (Cain).

Based on The Famous Five series, various board games, card games, video games and interactive books have been developed over the years allowing fans to engage with Blyton's adventurous world beyond the books. In the 1950s and 1960s, board games based on The Famous Five were released containing elements of mystery solving and adventure similar to the plotlines of the original stories. During these years, jigsaw puzzles were produced by BeStime as part of their numbered series¹⁵ and subsequently in the 1970s by Whitman which contained puzzles¹⁶ based on the book series as well as the TV series. Later in the 1980s and 1990s gamebooks have been developed to create a simulative experience for the fans of the series. These gamebooks are continuation books that are loosely based on the original books and allow the reader to have a real time experience of the adventures when they choose their path through the stories of The Famous Five. The books encouraged problem-solving and

decision-making, creating an immersive experience for young readers. Two series of the gamebooks have been published, the first one by Stephen Thraves where in eight gamebooks¹⁷ have been published by Hodder and Stoughton (“Famous Five Adventure Gamebooks”). These games were also translated into languages such as Swedish, Spanish, Italian and Dutch. The second series by Mary Danby had around six gamebooks¹⁸ published by Knights Books which have the abridged versions of a few of the original books with some additional parts for alternative storylines (“Famous Five (Mary Danby)”). These games have been translated into German and Italian languages making them popular among children and adolescents.

Biographies¹⁹ have been written on Enid Blyton’s life, focusing on her literary career as well as her personal life to understand the popularity associated with her works as she is said to have authored seven hundred and two thousand short stories along with many poems and magazine articles. Additionally, a considerable amount of academic research has been done on The Famous Five series given its popularity and worldwide reader appeal. Rudd explores the concept of gender with a socio-historical perspective besides having taken a survey based on the reader response on the Famous Five series in the chapter titled “Five Have a Genderful Time: Blyton, Sexism and the Infamous Five” in his doctoral thesis²⁰ (Rudd, *Five Have a Genderful Time*). Sheila Ray through her research explores ‘The Blyton Phenomenon’ examining the controversies surrounding Blyton’s work and recognizing the enduring appeal of Blyton’s stories to its readers (Ray). Research papers as well as dissertations on the issues of gender based on stereotypes and challenges have been put forward by Katrina A. Marshall, Liezel Coetzee and Ndaja Jukic, to name a few. Socio historical, topographical, lexical and linguistic approaches have been tackled, widening the scope of research on the series so far, inviting further research from interdisciplinary fields of study.

The Famous Five series has remained a beloved classic for over eighty years sustaining its charm and allure. Though the series consisted of simple plots and predictable storylines, the stories captivated the readers with themes of friendship, adventure, mystery and independence and with its fascinating settings and spirited characters. This paper has attempted to trace the development of the series through its various adaptations and examine the factors that contributed to its lasting appeal. The enduring appeal of the series in its adaptations owes its due to the skilful blend of universal themes with the contemporary sensibilities while retaining its original essence. Traversing from its humble origins as children’s novels to its numerous adaptations across media, the Famous Five has proven its ability to transcend time and cultures, leaving its indelible mark in the field of children’s literature.

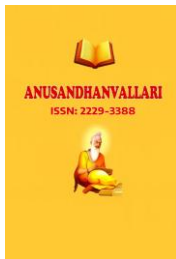
