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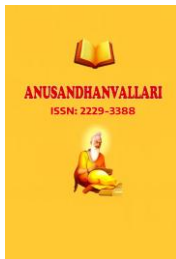

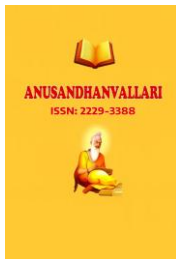
commander who effectively countered the maritime ambitions of the Portuguese, Dutch, and British during the 18th century.

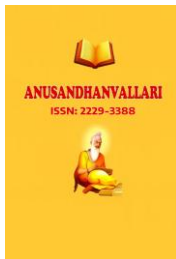
These objectives help in understanding the relationship between history and literature and demonstrate the continuing relevance of Malgonkar's works.

These findings confirm that Malgonkar occupies a significant position among Indian English novelists and that his works continue to offer valuable insights into history, society, and human nature.

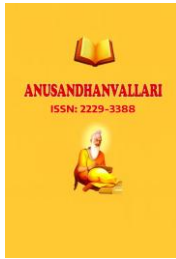
Conclusion
