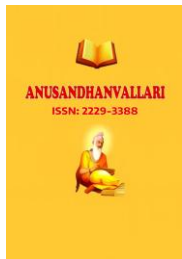

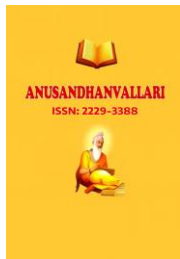
Symbolic Philosophy in India

Figure 1: Symbolic Interpretation Framework [Source:Author]

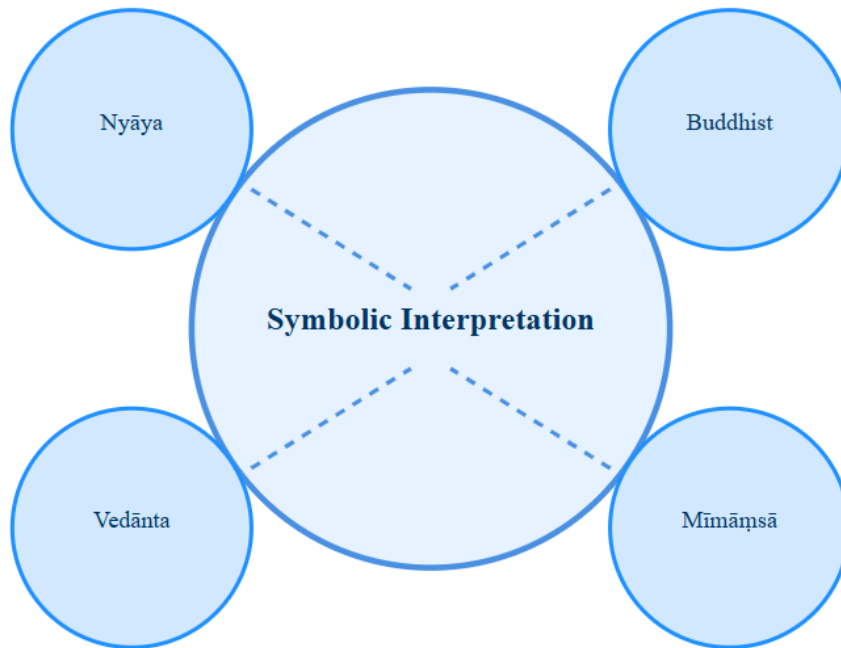

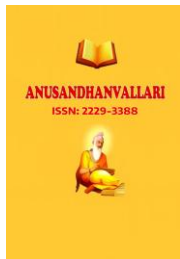

Philosophical linguistics now follows fresh trends.

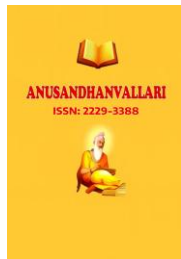
